BACKGROUND

- Unique area
- Greater Houston Off Road Biking Association (GHORBA) has made positive impact on the trails pre-2019

ISSUE since 2019

- Loss of Habitat and reduced natural beauty (Terry Hershey)
- Discouraging Multi-use (**safety** concerns)
- Temporary Right of Entry (TROE) contract for trail maintenance not understood

SOLUTION

- Discussions with Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD), Precinct 4 and GHORBA
- Sustainable (Social, Environmental, Economic (**liability**))
 - Multi-use
 - Trust and Transparency

Temporary Right of Entry (TROE)

The TROE signed between HCFCD and GHORBA allows for safety-related maintenance of technical features (bike jumps):

Authority for permanent construction or modification of all trails, technical features, and appurtenances upon the District's Lands other than restorative or for safety-related purposes is not permitted.

Although residents use the trail for a wide variety of activities, there was a common theme on why they appreciated the trails:

- 78% love the natural trails
- 68% mention nature as reason why they love them

I love the trails. I love the animals I can see. I wish people would not leave their trash behind. Maybe a few more trash cans would be helpful! There should not be anymore bike jumps been built.

I like them as is , I'm afraid if they pave the area it will attract more people. There is a paved trail on the north side so I don't see a need for any paving on the south side

Want to keep them as natural as possible

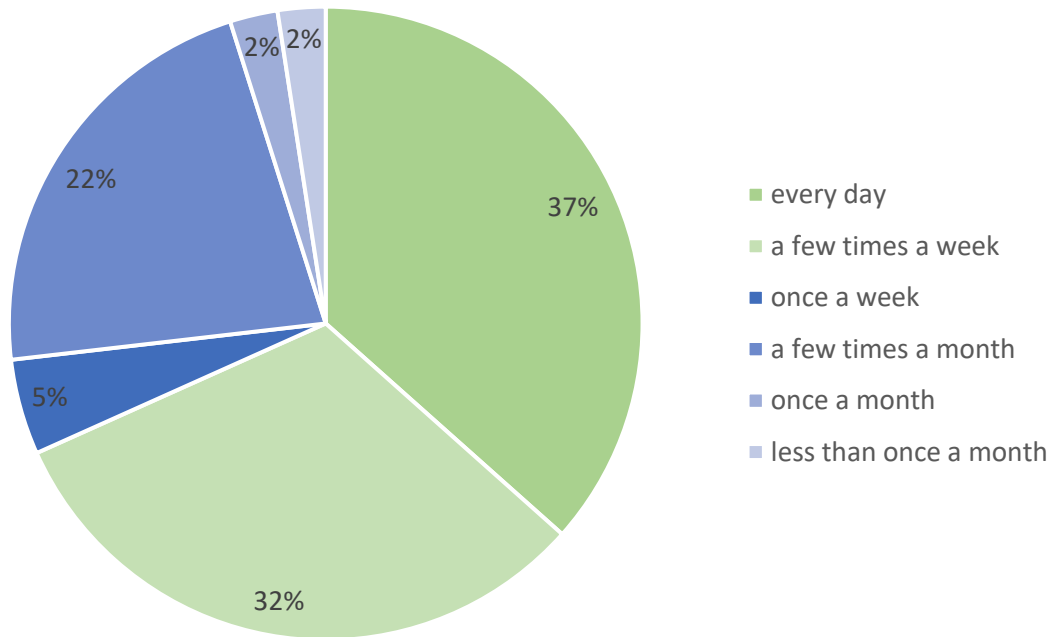
I love the trails, please don't destroy them! I hate the high-speed biking jumps that have been installed pretty much everywhere on the trails. These are very dangerous to pedestrians.

Like the easy access - Bicyclists tent to be careless with pedestrian

Love the ruggedness and pure nature feel. The only area in Houston easily accessible without hearing traffic and great small hikes for kids. I hate the high usage, both people and bikes on weekends. We avoid visiting the area on weekends or holidays and go in the mornings.

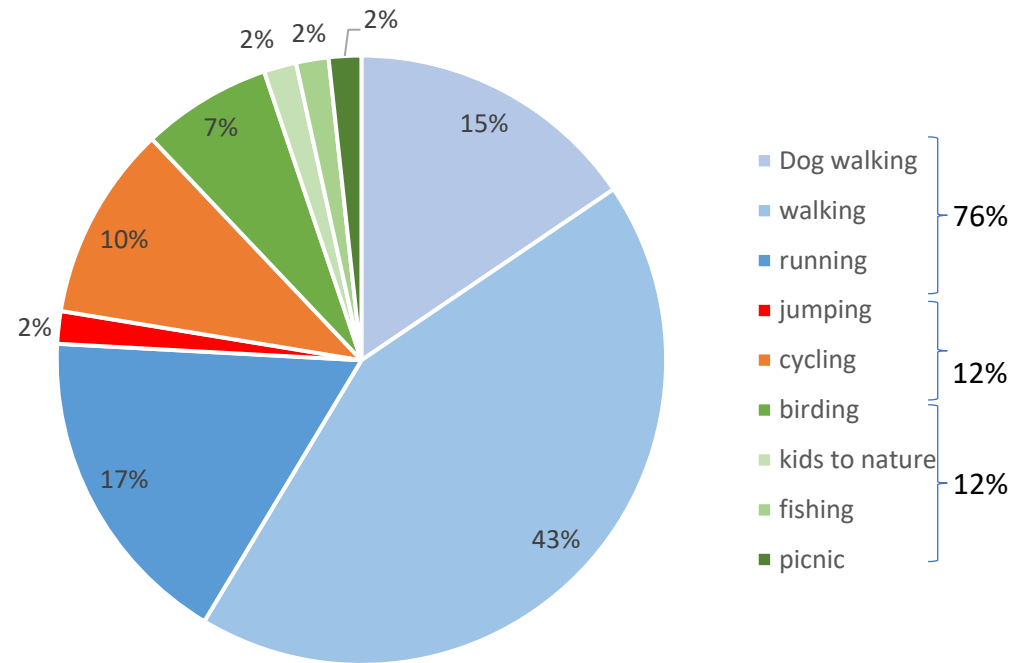

How often do you use the trails?



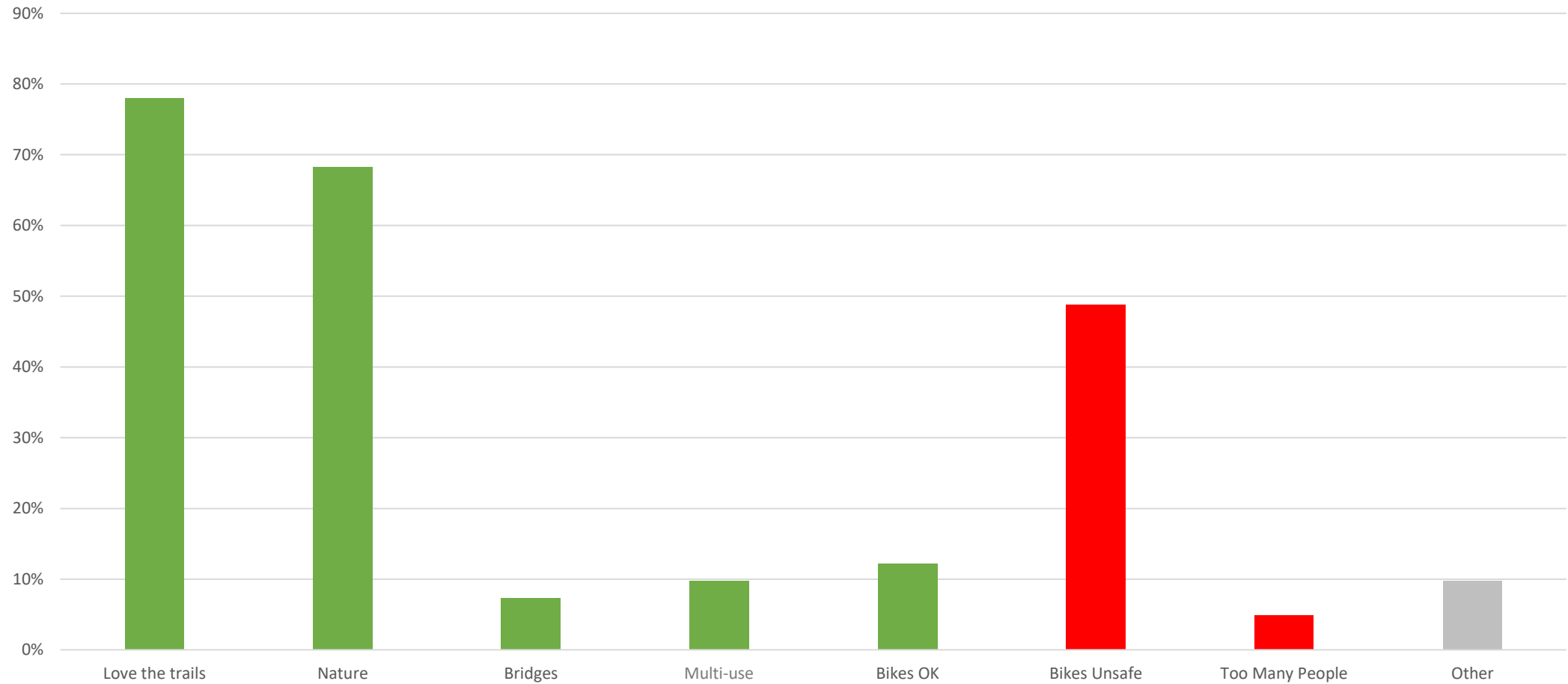
69% on the trails a few times a week or every day

Activities that you use the trail area / bayou for



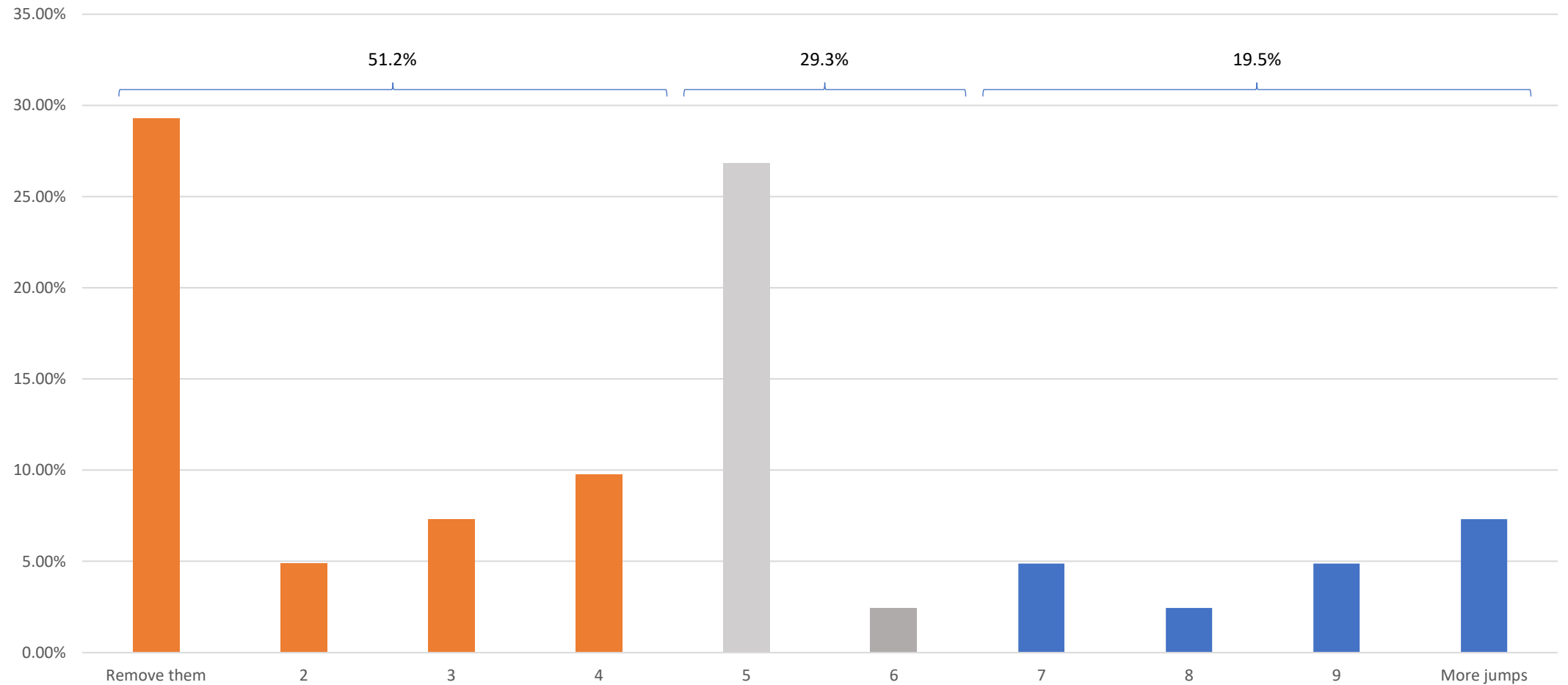

Growing Concern about bikes

- I've seen too many near misses with children and other trail runners and walkers with bikers who adopt a "get out of my way " attitude as they come barreling off the jumps. I don't mind having one area for this type of biking but not along the whole trail. It's dangerous.
- I cannot have a fun walk with my granddaughters there any more for fear of them getting run over by bikers who don't even announce that they are approaching.
- I have also witnessed at least 5 rescues by the paramedics of bikers that fell and could not move. Lots of these men are not experienced and I have seen many children under 12 doing these jumps, some even without helmets.
- It is more dangerous to walk with bikers on the path, than on the highway with cars.
- I do not understand why officials allow construction in a flood control managed area. They should be removed.
- The bike jumps have become hurdles make it difficult to walk even when bikers are around. You always have to look out for bikers raising down the trails wanting to jump over crossing paths and be ready to jump behind a tree when they come racing
